



## Cannon County Schools Attendance Policy for Cannon County Students

Woodbury, TN July 2025. Cannon County Schools attendance policy and procedures reflect Tennessee State law. Parents and students will need to review student handbooks carefully at the beginning of the school year to understand the district's policy and procedures governing attendance.

Students who enter the progressive \*Attendance Tier Intervention process will receive additional supports. Students enter the Tier Intervention process when they are absent 3 days without adequate excuse (unexcused absence). Under each tier, students will be provided with support that will help them to stay in school. Judge Matt Cowan and other community service providers will work along with the Supervisor of Attendance to address issues with students' attendance. The goal is to reduce the number of students who may be summoned into juvenile court for attendance issues.

**Remember, attending school has a positive impact on children's academic success from kindergarten to high school graduation.** For context, most students in Tennessee miss six or less days each school year.

Although some absences are unavoidable due to health problems or other circumstances, students who miss too much school—regardless of the reason—fall behind academically. Absences can add up quickly. Students are less likely to succeed academically if they miss 10% or more of instructional days over the course of the school year (this means missing about two days of school per month or about 18 days per year).

Did you know?

- Being 5 minutes late to or leaving early from school daily is equivalent to missing 3.4 days per year.
- Being 15 minutes late to or leaving early from school daily is equivalent to missing 10.3 days per year.
- Being 30 minutes late to or leaving early from school daily is equivalent to missing 20.7 days per year.

Research shows:

- Tennessee students who are chronically absent in kindergarten are 15 percentage points less likely to reach proficiency in either 3<sup>rd</sup> grade math or ELA.
- Nationally, four out of five students who miss more than 10% of both kindergarten and first grade are unable to read on grade-level by third grade.
- The problem continues as students get older. Tennessee students who are chronically absent in 9<sup>th</sup> grade are 30 percentage points less likely to earn an on-time diploma (62% vs. 92%).

We don't want your child to fall behind in school or get discouraged. Please ensure that your child attends school every day and arrives on time. Below are a few practical tips to help support regular attendance.



## Attendance Pointers for Parents

- Make sure your children keep a regular bedtime and establish a morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Make sure your children go to school every day unless they are truly sick.
- Avoid scheduling vacations or doctor's appointments when school is in session.
- Develop back up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, neighbor, or another parent to take your child to school.
- Talk to teachers and counselors for advice if your child feels anxious about going to school or show other signs of not wanting to go to school.
